








CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HOLIDAY EVENTS

NOVEMBER 8th, 2022 is Election Day!

If you are a registered voter, you will receive a ballot in the mail for the upcoming election. The City of Brownsville positions up for election include the Mayor's position (with 2 candidates running), and three

Council positions (with 6 candidates running).

Brownsville City Hall is a designated drop off location to receive your ballot. Ballots may also be returned by USPS mail to Linn County Elections. Brownsville City Hall will be open extended hours on Election Day, from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m.



Be Part of Something Bigger

The City belongs to the Rural Economic Alliance, or REAL, which provides business support and resources to existing and potential businesses locating in town. The Alliance is comprised of nine communities in the valley including Lebanon, Sweet Home, Philomath, Adair Village, Halsey, Monroe, Harrisburg & Tangent. The group will be launching a website designed to help connect business owners with resources that will allow them to expand or even startup a business. The City has been working on this project for eight years. It originally started as part of the

Ford Family Foundation's effort to assist in rural Oregon.



What's Happening at the Brownsville Rec Center?

The City is working with Woodblock Architecture to draw plans for the renovation of the Rec Center. The Rec Center officially became City property in 2018 after the Central Linn School Board agreed to convey the property to City ownership at the request of City Council. The Central

Linn Recreation Association has been operating youth sports programming for over fifty years for the Central Linn community. Since 1981, the City has maintained the building with the help of the Association. The building serves as the center of operations for the Association.


The renovation will be "head-to-toe" update of the facility. Fire and Life Safety are driving many of the decisions. Bringing the building into the 21st century is proving to be a challenge. The gymnasium will be redone with a new scoreboard and new backboards, a new stage area, storage rooms, restrooms, catering kitchen and a large meeting room. Accessibility will be improved with ADA ramps and entrances for the facility. New HVAC, electrical, and plumbing are included.

The facility will be renovated with the intention of using the facility fifty more years. The City had the building reviewed by structural engineers to ensure it could withstand a full-scale renovation project. The City will make small seismic modifications, replace all the windows and doors, and paint the entire building inside and out. The renovation is slated to being June 1st, 2023 and end in the middle of September 2023.

TOTAL MAXIMUM DAILY LOAD (TMDL)

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) under the direction and requirement of the Envi-



ronmental Protection Agency (EPA) are concerned about what is known as non-point source pollution. Pollutants such as herbicides, pesticides, and other residues runoff into water sources such as the Calapooia River. Pollutants are harmful to the watershed and river system. The DEQ requires cities to monitor certain parameters to ensure a healthy river system.

The City of Brownsville's Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) requires the City to monitor activities that would potentially cause harm. Activities include monitoring bacteria, temperature, mercury and illegal discharges. There are ways you can positively affect river quality. You can use one of the several pet waste stations in the park to clean up after your pet. You can plant trees and other types of native species that help remove unwanted pollutants. You can make


sure that any erosion on your property is repaired to limit the amount of sedimentation that would potentially get into the river system. You can report any illegal dumping into ditches or sewer manholes.

Make sure that your downspouts are attached properly to your home and your internal storm drainage system. Homeowners are encouraged to keep storm water on-sight either through retention or detention ponds or swales. The City requires new construction to eliminate practices that would cause excess runoff, sedimentation and other unwanted effects from directly entering waterways. Remember, all drains go to the river.

VINEYARD WIND MACHINES

The machines may turn on soon depending on temperatures. Due to low overnight temperatures, the wind machines are used to prevent 'cold injury' to the grape vines which could negatively impact harvest.

The wind machines are very noisy due to the engines

used. Basically, the machines are programmed to turn on at certain temperature levels, generally around 36 F and can

only be ran during certain wind speeds. The site (south of town) has numerous wind machines and they generate a very noticeable sound throughout town. The motors sound like an old farm tractor and the blades have a high-pitched sound. A low frequency hum can be heard throughout town when all the wind machines are operating.



DID YOU KNOW? Finding property pins can be tricky. If a survey was done for your property, a



map with property dimensions & access to a **metal detector** can be great tools for this undertaking. You can call the Linn County Surveyor's office (541.967.3857) to see if there is a recorded survey of your property. If so, it can be emailed, or you can pick up a hard

copy (for a fee, depending on the size).

FENCES: Fences can be beautiful, functional additions to a property, providing safety for children & pets, as well as a finishing touch to your home & landscape. Contact Elizabeth Coleman, Monday-Thursday, 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m, to obtain a **Fence Permit Application (\$30)** or a copy of Brownsville's Fence Standards. Onsite verification of property lines is required.





Accessory Structures: 200/15 Over & Under Rule

If your **non-habitable**, **one-story** accessory structure is **OVER 200 sq. ft.** & exceeds 15ft high from the grade plane to the average height of the highest roof surface, a permit from both Linn County (TBD) & the City (\$30) are required. If your one-story, non-habitable accessory structure is **200 sq. ft.** & **UNDER**, a permit from the City only is required. Call Elizabeth Coleman, Monday through Thursday, 8:30am – 4:30pom. for details.
